Lighted Way provides students with multiple disabilities, developmental delays, traumatic brain injuries, autism, intellectual disabilities, and other health impairments with individualized education programs by certified school staff.

The Illinois Valley's need for Lighted Way's services has never been greater!

Lighted Way's current Children's Developmental Center – a twostory home constructed in the early 1900's with 5 additions since 1963 – is bursting at the seams!

We have BIG news to share!

To address this demand and need for additional space, earlier this year, Lighted Way completed the purchase of the former Heritage Manor to become its future home. The new school will feature six larger, specialized classrooms (Pre-K, K – grade 2, grades 3-5, grades 6-8, high school, and transition); age-appropriate sensory rooms; a classroom for learning self-care, cooking, and other life skills, and auxiliary classrooms for all services provided (physical, occupational, speech, vision, and hearing therapy), all of which meeting ADA standards.

The renovation of this new 33,000+ sq. ft. facility is a massive undertaking, especially for a private non-profit exempt from state and federal funding.
